

## **This Month**

Our October meeting will be presented by **Bob Angell**, a Managing Partner of *Applied Management Informatics* in Salt Lake City. He will share his expertise and experience in



**Database Connectivity** to the AS/400 and how to use the AS/400 as a database server.

Bob is an expert in the subject and is in the process of writing a book on this topic to be

published next spring. Bob has also published other work in this field. This is going to be a great interactive presentation where you can ask specific questions about your needs and get answers. The information given will give you fundamental knowledge to prepare for the future in AS/400 database connectivity and data interchange. Come out and feast on some great material!

### **Last Month**

Gary Larson of *Lagoon Corporation* gave a presentation on **Preparing for the Year 2000**. As you may or may not know, when the clock strikes midnight on December 31, 1999 many computer systems will crash or produce erroneous results if they are not changed. The problem lies with dates stored without the century, for example 10/02/96 instead of 10/02/1996. With dates stored in this manner computers don't know the difference between 1901 and 2001.

The presentation covered the following topics:

- What is the Year 2000 problem and why should I care?
- How widespread is the problem?
- What is being done about it?
- How much will it cost?
- What conversion options are available?
- What date handling options are available?
- What are the basic project steps?

Basically the point that was put across is that anything with a computer chip in it needs to be suspect and may potentially pose a problem. The main areas of concern included:

- 1. All legacy applications
- 2. In-house developed software
- 3. Vendor software
  - Is the vendor working on the problem?
  - Is it going to cost you?
  - Is the vendor still in business?
  - Is the source available?
- 4. Most pre-Pentium PCs
- 5. Older DOS applications
- 6. Client/Server systems
- 7. User created spreadsheets and databases
- 8. Security systems
- 9. Elevator controls
- 10. Copy and fax machines
- 11. Bar code systems
- 12. ATM machines
- 13. Credit card systems
- 14. Cash registers

The cost of converting all the world's software to handle the year 2000 has been estimated anywhere from \$300 billion (IBM), to \$600 billion (Gartner Group). The job is no small task.

When it comes to the year 2000 problem you have several options to choose from. They are:

Option 1: Do nothing (and pray!)

Option 2: Replace systems with purchased software

**Option 3: Totally re-write current systems** 

**Option 4: Outsource entire conversion** 

Option 5: Hire consultants to help you with conversion

Option 6: Purchase tools to help you do the conversion

Option 7: Do analysis and conversion yourself

Option 8: Retire in the fall of 1999

The next portion of the presentation covered what date handling options are available and the pros and cons of each one. Then the last part of the presentation discussed the basic project phases involved with doing the conversion yourself:

**Phase 1: Preparation** 

Phase 2: Evaluate and select conversion tools

Phase 3: Physical software inventory

Phase 4: Impact analysis

Phase 5: Develop plan of action

Phase 6: Do a small pilot conversion

Phase 7: Main software conversion Phase 8: Testing

Time is running out. You only have 3 years to complete this task and this is one project with an immovable, drop-dead, set-in-stone deadline!

Q: I use a "zip" package to compress data I'm sending between two PCs so I can reduce my telephone connect time. I'd like to do the same with AS/400 files. Is there a utility that will let me compress files and reports on the AS/400 and then decompress them on the PC?

**A:** You can compress files and send them across platforms with PKZIP AS/400 from ASI, Inc. (513-222-9012). The product sells for \$2,950 (in North America); it's available for Unix and MVS environments as well.
