Last Month

Bob Angell from *AMI - Applied Management Informatics*, in Salt Lake City presented our October session. Bob demonstrated the various capabilities of the AS/400 as a database server connected to a variety of client and host environments. One of the methods of communications between client and server is the TCP/IP protocol. It is becoming the universal means of conversing between various platforms and systems.

Bob illustrated how various applications and systems could be configured and implemented to take advantage of this protocol. He also presented numerous other options in configuring database communication links depending on the configuration of the systems and software that may exist in any particular installation. Examples of these options include SNA with APPC or APPN. Most of these communication methods are used to hook the AS/400 up to almost any database, client, or system an installation may have. Bob proficiently demonstrated many options to connect to mainframe databases, client PC systems, in addition to Oracle, Sybase, and Informix databases.

The bottom line is the AS/400, with its DB/2, Unix, and PC file system is the only system on the market today with the capability to process all three database in the same machine. In addition, the AS/400 can also connect to practically any other system made, and is a great database server machine. Thank you Bob for a great presentation!!!

Christmas Luncheon

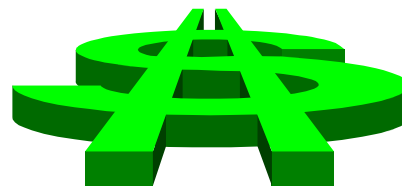

IBM has announced Transformation 2000 Express/400, a packaged services offering designed to assist customers in managing their Year 2000 analysis and conversion activities. The fee for this services offering will be based on the AS/400 group code of the processor on which the tool will be installed, from \$17,000 to \$34,000.

AS/400 Tips and Techniques

Q: We're trying to come up with a new date strategy for existing files. One proposal is to add new date fields (in native date data type format) to the end of the file corresponding to the existing 6-digit *yymmdd* numeric "date" fields; the new date fields are duplicates of the existing 6-digit dates. We would modify the programs that update the 6-digit dates so they also modify the new dates we've added to the end of the file. Then, on an as-needed basis, we'd convert programs to use the new date.

However, one quirk occurred when using the CPYF (Copy File) command. Even with *MAP *DROP specified, the new date fields were initialized with today's date, rather than with the expected 00.00.0000 or 01.01.0001. Is there a way to prevent this?

A: It sounds as if you're copying from FILE1 to FILE2 with FMTOPT(*MAP *DROP), and you defined date fields in FILE2 that aren't included in FILE1. If that's the case, when you use CPYF, the system uses default values for fields in the file named in the TOFILE parameter (FILE2) that aren't in the file named in the FROMFILE parameter (FILE1). A character field's default value is blanks; a numeric field's default value is zeros. For date fields, the default value is the current date.

You can, however, control default values used in the physical file. To control the default value for dates you can use the DDS in the following example:

```
A      R  REC01
A      DATE1      L      DATFMT( *ISO )
A      DATE1      L      DFT( '0001-01-01' )
A      DATE2      L      DATFMT( *USA )
A      DATE2      L      DFT( '01/01/0001' )
```

Now when you use CPYF to copy to this file, you'll get these values for your default.
