AS/400 Tips and Techniques

Qualify Those Program Names

OS/400 commands and interprogram communications make it easy to run or call programs without qualifying the program name with the library name. This means someone

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can sneak into your system by placing an identically named program in a library higher on the library list than the one in which your program resides.

For example, if a calling program doesn't qualify a call to program PGMA, and a hacker's PGMA is in a library higher on the library list than your PGMA's library, the calling program's call to what you think is your PGMA may call the hacker's PGMA instead. Once called, the hacker's program can perform any tasks the current user of the calling program has authority to do. And think about the additional security exposure if the hacker's program adopts authority (acquiring all the authorities of the calling program's owner)!

The cure: Make sure no one can insert programs in libraries ahead of yours (e.g., secure libraries so you control who adds objects to those libraries and secure commands that might let users alter their library lists), or qualify your program calls.
