March Meeting Highlights

The topic of our April meeting was Lotus Notes and the AS/400 and was presented by Jeff Williams and Scott Anderson. Jeff is with IBM and is the Western Region Manager for Notes on the AS/400. Scott is with Assist Cornerstone Technologies and is Vice President - Integrated Services. Jeff and Scott covered a vast amount of information concerning Lotus Notes and how you can combine its strengths with the AS/400 to enhance your existing applications. Key features of AS/400 integration of Lotus Notes are:

- Runs Lotus Notes 4.
- Enables the AS/400 to be a server in your Notes network. Up to 16 Notes servers can be supported, one per Integrated PC Server (FSIOP).
- Enables Notes users to exchange electronic mail with OfficeVision users through SMTP MTA.
- Provides integration of the AS/400 System Distribution Directory with the Notes Name and Address Book.
- Provides data integration with the DB2 relational database on AS/400 to enable your Notes users to access existing business data.
- Provides a link from your AS/400 legacy applications to the world of workflow applications with Lotus Notes.

- Provides simple-to-use mobile computing for AS/400 users through the use of Notes replication.
- Enables remote dial-in through an asynchronous TCP/IP link.
- Provides document-level backup and recovery through ADSM.

New Momentum For AS/400

After three years of stagnant sales, IBM's AS/400 is in the midst of a comeback. Customers are returning to the AS/400, abandoning efforts to build data warehouses on cheaper, and less scaleable, Windows NT Pentium servers. "If we had stayed with NT for the data warehouse, we'd be dead in the water now," says Ollie Ayers, IS director for Central Talk Management Inc., a \$500 million telemarketing firm in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

David Chaffer, senior technical consultant for Baxter Export, says NT servers were sufficient for small amounts of data, but when he tried to add a year's worth of data, performance ground to a halt. "We had to reload everything, including the operating system, and that took several days, " says Chaffer. "It was much more painful than the way the AS/400 works, where you just add more DASD."

ODBC REALITIES/MYTHS

ODBC is not ODBC is not ODBC

There has been a lot of discussion about the speed of ODBC, but there are several points which need to be considered:

#1 - Not all ODBC drivers are alike. Just because ODBC is slow to database X doesn't mean ODBC will be slow to the AS/400. Different database vendors have placed different priorities on the speed of ODBC access to their database. AS/400 has placed a high priority on the speed of ODBC access to AS/400. In Infoworld, an application benchmark was run using the Rumba ODBC driver and the Client Access ODBC driver. Rumba: 28 minutes. CA: 8 minutes. (Further tuning took CA down to 1.3 minutes.) Client Access provides the best ODBC driver for DB2/400.

#2 - An ODBC application, like any other application, can be written to perform poorly or fantastically. There is a lot of good information out from Rochester on good/bad ways to program to ODBC. These range from the worst (ODBC with Data Access Objects VB)...to much better (ODBC stored

procedures). These are documented in the redbook "AS/400 Client/Server Performance using the Windows Clients" - SG24-4526-01.

AS/400 Tips and Techniques

The User Profile that Wouldn't Die

Q: I have a user profile that I can't delete. Every time I try to delete it, I get an error saying that the user profile owns some objects. But when I run the WRKOBJOWN (Work with Objects by Owner) command, I can't find anything the user owns. I've deleted the user from OfficeVision/400, disabled the account, changed the password, and removed the profile from all application-level security, but I can't delete the profile from the system. HELP?

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A: To kill the profile, first run the DSPUSRPRF (Display User Profile) command:

DSPUSRPRF USRPRF(USER) TYPE(*OBJOWN)

This command will show the folders owned by the user. If the command produces a result, you can either track down what the folders are or run the DLTUSRPRF (Delete User Profile) command with the following parameters:

DLTUSRPRF USRPRF(user) +
OWNOBJOPT(*CHGOWN newowner)

This changes the ownership of the objects to another owner.

If these commands don't work, try reclaiming storage with the RCLSTG (Reclaim Storage) command and then follow it with DLTUSRPRF (as shown above). The user may have owned objects that have lost their library pointer or that are otherwise damaged.
