AS/400 Tips and Techniques

Timestamping to the Millisecond with RPG

RPG provides no way to access the system time to the millisecond. If you need to timestamp events down to the millisecond, create a physical file with the timestamp field in it, and create a logical file over this physical file that excludes the timestamp field. When you perform an RPG write through the logical file, OS/400 will fill in the timestamp field with the current system date and time to the millisecond.
