April Meeting

March Meeting Highlights

For March we met at the IBM office in Salt Lake and were treated with a presentation by **Robin Van Wagenen** and **Sue Griffin** of IBM. The topic was the <u>AS/400 February Announcements & Directions</u>. They covered a slew of announcements for the AS/400 including the following:

- **IBM Network Station**. This is IBM's version of the Network Computer (NC) that you read so much about in the trade publications. It is a simple, low cost device that you attach a keyboard and a monitor to and allows you to do terminal emulation, connect to multiple servers, access the internet and intranet, and run Java applications. It is centrally controlled and managed eliminating much of the management costs associated with PCs.
- **Java for the AS/400**. If you haven't heard about Java, the hot new programming language developed by Sun Microsystems, you must be in a coma. The appeal of Java is the ability to run the same application of many

different hardware platforms. The AS/400 can execute Java applications today because of a recent port of Sun's JDK 1.0.2 to the AS/400. This implementation runs on top of OS/400 and therefore is not optimized for speed. IBM is currently working on integrating the Java technology with the OS/400 operating system to give it the speed it needs to execute Java code. As this technology is developed it will allow GUI applications to run directly on the AS/400 without modifications. This will allow AS/400 programs to have graphical interfaces using the standard Java language on the AS/400.

- Integrated PC Server (IPCS). The IPCS (formerly known as the FSIOP) is the next step in the evolution of the file serving IOP family. It now sports either a 486 66MHz, Pentium 133MHz or Pentium 166MHz processor and can have up to 256 MB of memory.
- Novell NetWare and Integrated PC Server. Greater integration has been achieved with the IPCS and Novell Netware providing synchronized user profiles and passwords, access to NetWare printers even from twinax users, access to NetWare files from Client Access users and AS/400 applications, and simplified network operations.

Windows NT Support on AS/400 by '98

IBM and Microsoft recently announced plans to deliver by the first quarter of 1998 AS/400 systems that support Windows NT applications, according to the March 3 issue of Information Week magazine. It will be implemented using a 200-MHz Pentium Pro IPCS card and allow users to download files and records from a DB2/400 database and load them into NT applications. Users will be able to back up all NT files onto AS/400 storage. Although IBM and Microsoft were able to put this deal together it doesn't mean the relationship is any more that lukewarm.

South American Chic - Cell Phones!

With IBM's revenue last year at an all-time high of \$75.9 billion, you would think the company would like to keep chairman and CEO Lou Gerstner on board for a while

longer. But his 1996 salary and bonus dropped \$5,000 from the prior year! Before you get out your handkerchiefs you need to remember that his salary for 1996 was \$4,770,000! And the \$5,000 pay cut was more than made up by a bonus payout of nearly \$2.1 million -- half in cash, the rest in restricted stock. If Lou doesn't want the job I know of someone who would be willing to step in and take over!

AS/400 Tips and Techniques

Printing a PC5250 Screen

Q: Is there any way to get PC5250 to print a copy of the screen on the AS/400 the way Rumba does when you press the PC keyboard's Print screen key? I know I can use the Windows functions to print a copy of the screen on my PC or LAN printer, but how do I create a print file on the AS/400?

A: Although the Client Access for Windows 95 version of PC5250 doesn't let you remap the Print screen key, you can still perform a host print screen. By default, PC5250 uses Ctrl-Pause to generate a print screen to an AS/400 print file. You can remap this function to other keys but not to the PC Print screen key. In addition, you can generate a print screen to a Windows-attached printer by clicking on the Print screen icon (the first icon on the PC5250 toolbar). PC5250 also lets you put a PC print screen on the Windows clipboard by pressing the standard PC Print screen key.
